Presidents Report

I can say with confidence and 10 years of experience at an ANSA NSW committee level that 2006 / 2007 has been the busiest year for all the members of the state committee, myself included. Stepping up to the plate and taking on the role of President last year was a pretty easy transition for me, in fact my role is relatively easy with the committee doing most of the work to keep the association running day to day. Their support and enthusiasm, coupled with the dedication that they bring to the table means that ANSA NSW has achieved a lot this past year and much of the groundwork we are laying has steadied the association. It has been a very cohesive year for us with each committee member doing their job without to much undue pressure from above; I have not needed to wave my big stick about for last 12 months and for this I thank the committee and look forward to the 2007/2008 season.

The 2006/2007 committee saw long time veteran Yanko Serifi take on the role as state secretary, and with almost 10 years as past state secretary under his belt, I have not needed to ask him to complete any task associated with his position, in fact most of my phone calls to him asking if he has sent this out, organised this or responded to that are cut off with Yanko saying "It's done, what else do you want?" This makes my job much easier.

This year also saw Joe Garufi come on as Club Liaisons Officer and I doubt that there is anyone in ANSA NSW who has not heard of the name Garufi! The flow of information hitting the database members is mind-blowing and with access to many sources within the government we are finding that we are getting information out to the membership days and weeks before it comes through official channels. I have not counted the emails that Joe has sent out, but I am confident that at least once a week the membership is hearing from ANSA NSW. Our Tightlines are going out after every committee meeting, minutes, bulletins, press releases and special offers are being sent out, the only thing that we will continually ask the clubs to do is to pass on the information down to their members.

Darren Hossack stuck around in the role as State Recorder and was kept busy with an increase in his work load with the addition of the Convention Circuit Competition, added patronage of the State Titles, 12 month competition and state records. Again, without any stick waving from me Darren has done a great job processing all the claims and organising the state fishing competitions. Most if not everything that you need for the state titles, record claims and updated results are on the website, which is updated regularly.

We also saw Shane Jasprizza put his hand up, albeit timidly in the beginning to become our new \$\$\$ man in the role of Treasurer. Shane was wooed by John Burgess into the role and by all accounts has done a great job, even under the watchful eye of Mr. Burgess who has no qualms about telling you if you do something wrong and after working with John for 18 years at a South Sydney club level, I am qualified to say that. Sorry John!

Shane thought he was on a roll as he also takes over as Membership Officer from Mark Berthoin who is stepping aside after 3 years due to added work commitments. One thing we all need to keep in mind that in most cases our work and family life come first and we need to 'find' time to take on these committee positions. Many thanks to Mark and many thanks to Shane who is our new Membership Officer.

We have also finally filled the position of Masters Keeper, with Max Castle putting his hand up to take on the position. Bruce Tozer had been acting as caretaker untill we could find a replacement, and after 12 months handed the role over to Max. Once again all the Masters information is on the website and Max is doing a great job in keeping track of our masters awards, some of his records are over 20 years old so a fair bit of homework in needed to verify these claims. Many thanks to Bruce for a great job over the years.

As always, John Burgess has been flying the flag for us as Vice President of the association. Having shaken his shackles as Treasurer, he has worked flat out ensuring that the members of ANSA NSW are well represented at a state, national and international level. The amount of work and correspondence generated by John over the email would surely crash lesser computer systems, however the committee takes it all in our stride and advise John of how best to serve the membership at these levels. Many issues being driven by John include marine parks, grey nurse sharks, competition accreditation and code of practice, fishing safety and personal floatation devices, submarine cables, desalination plants and sewerage works, Botany Bay port expansion, preservation of fishing access, fisheries research and the Commonwealth resource sharing review of the Eastern Tuna and Billfish Fishery (ETBF). John also sites on the NSW Recreational Fishing Saltwater Trust Expenditure Committee as and ANSA NSW representative, gives some insight into where our licence fees are being spent.

The Angel Ring Team has had a cracking year in terms of achievements that is covered elsewhere in this report and the team members all deserve a pat on the back, you can easily recognise these guys - they are wearing the bright orange Columbia Shirts. Speaking of which it was great to see 200+ shirts already being purchased from ANSANSW under a deal with Columbia, our next step is 20% discount on presentation of your ANSA NSW Card in selected Columbia stores. When these cards are issued in the next few months, we will be sending out a promotional flyer. As with the Escape with ET Lodge on Groote Is, were we secured an additional discount for ANSA NSW members, we are always on the look out for some better deals for the membership. Our website sponsors, Fish Therapy and Fishfinder offer 10% discount to the membership on tackle purchases and we are working on a few more deals in 2007/2008.

One thing I was really pleased to see this year was a new website design and re-build of www.ansansw.com.au. As Shane mentions in his report, this did cost us about \$1200, but I was confident that selected sponsorship would offset this cost. In the end we secured \$1000 to offset this cost, and the annual fees will cover our service fees and updates. In a few years the website will be generating income for us that will be a bonus.

I was pleased to see Shane selected for a RECFISH Future Leaders 3 day Workshop in Darwin in September, along with Mark Holland from South Sydney AFA, these two NSW members we selected from the ANSA membership to attend this workshop. Members like Shane and Mark will be invaluable over the next few years in establishing links with state and federal governments and other state fishing bodies.

At an ANSA NSW State committee and sub committee level I have the ability to tap into a wealth of resources and contacts that these committee members bring to the table, the knowledge base is extensive and the arguments being put forward by ANSA and a state and federal level have all been well researched and well received.

I was also pleased to see a new club come into the fold that is unique. I agreed to assist in setting up a website based fishing club based on an existing forum at www.thefishingsite.com.au. The Fishing Site Sportfishers Club has just been set up with 10 new ANSA NSW members, and is unique that all meetings, AGM and business are completed online. We have and ANSA presence and my own club, South Sydney AFA has a presence on the site, with the guys at the website willing to extend the offer to all ANSA NSW Clubs. SSAFA uses this page as a way of informing the public what we are doing and have gained a few new club members already. Have a look and let me know if your club wants something similar, cost is nothing and a great alternative to those clubs who do not have access to their own websites. All we need is a logo and someone to update and monitor the page, pretty easy.

I was happy see that the membership once again hovered around the 1200 mark and our focus this year is increasing the membership. We will be refreshing the tagging programs with some new awards, looking at IGFA rated braids quite closely, as our initial testing of the Sunline range of IGFA rated braids indicating that the 4 line classes we tested all broke under, warranting further discussions with the manufacturers and distributors. The supply of fresh information out to the clubs and new and innovative ways to improve our fishing are also on the agenda. Feedback to the committee from the clubs has been sporadic throughout the year, and as is evident throughout this annual report we are doing a lot of work on your behalf and need to be told if there is anything else that we need to address or tackle on your clubs behalf. We are all an email or phone call away most days of the year.

Finally I would like to thank all the members out there who have continued supporting ANSA NSW. Many thanks for flying the ANSA flag from all of us at the ANSA NSW State Executive.

Vice Presidents Report

ANSA celebrates its 40 year anniversary this year. As an organisation we have come a long way since those early days in 1967 when a group of dedicated anglers met in Cairns and come to the conclusion that there was a pressing need for a National peak body to represent the interests of recreational fishers, to conserve our fisheries and habitats and to promote the ideals of recreational fishing as an organised and enjoyable sport for all.

40 years on, ANSA remains totally committed to its founding core values of "Sport Conservation and Integrity". With autonomous and well organised Branches in every State and an extensive network of affiliated clubs and members spread across Australia, ANSA is in a unique position to pick up and engage upon any issue that has a bearing on recreational fishing regardless of local, State or Commonwealth jurisdictions. It is this keen sense of grass roots awareness and concern coupled with the binding comradary across all levels of the ANSA framework that enables ANSA to get on with the job of trying to make a difference - whether it be to push the case for fishing access and preservation of our fisheries etc or to save lives through initiatives such as Angel Rings or fishing safety education.

ANSA is not all about fishing politics either but as times and public attitudes change there is an ever increasing need for ANSA to speak out and take a stand on issues that count either alone or in conjunction with other peak bodies including Recfish of which ANSA remains an active founding and supportive member.

This past year has been one of major challenge for ANSA at a State and National level with dual involvement on issues such as marine parks, grey nurse sharks, competition accreditation and code of practice, fishing safety and personal floatation devices, submarine cables, desalination plants and sewerage works, Botany Bay port expansion, preservation of fishing access, fisheries research etc to name a few.

A particular challenging and ongoing issue confronting ANSA and other peak bodies has been the Commonwealth resource sharing review of the Eastern Tuna and Billfish Fishery (ETBF) and our joint quest to have striped marlin declared a recreation only species and for longlining and the commercial use of live bait to be substantially restricted or at best phased out entirely.

After much soul searching it has been collectively agreed to adopt a pragmatic approach to the ETBF review and to conditionally endorse the review recommendations including spatial restrictions on longlining within the inshore waters of the ETBF zone and for striped marlin to remain a shared species. It is acknowledged that there will be some who will be unhappy at the softening of our position but it needs to be recognised that our conditional endorsement extends only for the term of the current review (2009) and as a trade off there will be a large tract of offshore water (extending from south east Qld to the far south coast of NSW) where longlining will no longer be allowed and a commitment to better research of the billfish fishery and commercial live bait use. These concessions, if adopted by the Government, are seen as ground-breaking steps for the future management of the fishery and preservation of marlin and other pelagic species.

Apart from its longstanding involvement with NSW Fisheries and the Game Fish Tagging Program, ANSA NSW continues to be actively involved in Fisheries research via the ANSA Austag program which extends right across Australia and is now regarded as the Nation's premier fish tagging programme with more than 500,000 fish captured, tagged and released since inception in 1985. ANSA has gradually become more and more involved with fisheries research issues based on the need for our members to have better information. ANSA has lead the way in promoting catch and release for the past 30 years so it was not surprising that ANSA was instrumental in establishing the very successful National Strategy for the Survival of Released fish. ANSA members have been involved directly in many of the research projects under that strategy.

Our other major initiatives are of course the Angel Ring and Rock Fishing Safety Projects. Our President Stan Konstantaras has been the driving force behind these projects for many years and under his direction both projects have moved beyond NSW into the national arena. Stan has covered these projects in his own report so I won't repeat his words of wisdom other than to say thank you to Stan and the project team on behalf of those whose lives have been saved and for the kudos your commitment and hard work have generated for ANSA. Keep up the great work.

ANSA and its members will continue to play a pivotal role in all issues that have a bearing on recreational fishing and the marine environment and management. We will continue to work with Governments and others and we see the interests of all recreational fishers best served by all like peak bodies working in unison towards common goals. Sure there will be times when we will agree to disagree on some issues but fundamentally the message is clear – we need to work together for the greater good.

Secretary's Message

To all the members of the Association, welcome to your Annual Report of the NSW Branch.

The Branch as a whole looks financially healthy. Income for the year was \$16225.08. Expenditure for the year was \$19855.68. Our forecast budget of \$210.00 for 2006/2007 was an actual deficit of \$3630.60. Refer to the Treasurer's report for a more detailed account over the last 12 months.

Membership, the Branch at present represents 33 clubs consisting of 1191 members and 250 families. Our direct membership branch club, Sportfishing NSW, has 20 members. Refer to Membership Report for more detail.

Due to personal reasons Mark Bethoin resigned on 1-7-07 and is replaced by Shane Jasprizza Treasurer. He will be in a dual role.

12 Month Competition entries were 161 for the year. Well down on last year of 310. This accounted for 10 clubs and 59 members. Refer to Recorder's Report for more detail.

Masters Claims for the last 12 months have been 9. Congratulations to all members that received their Masters over the last 12 months. Refer to Masters Keeper's Report for more detail.

Tagging, Catch and Release. Stan continued to perform an outstanding job. Well done Stan! The Tagging Masters scheme will be replaced by the AUSTAG Achievement Award and Tagging Excellence Award. Read Stan's report it is interesting with plenty of facts on how we caught fish and how tagging is evolving.

Club liaison continues to be an important portfolio and tool for keeping members informed. Well done to Joe Garufi. This year we entirely revamped the ANSA NSW website. This time it was done professionally through co-ordination by Joe. Check out the website on www.ansawnsw.com.au
Tightlines continued to be an important communication tool with plenty of editions through out the year. Refer to Joe's report for further reading.

The Angel Ring Project continues to be a success. With more lives saved. The project continues to receive good publicity and funding. The project was also incorporated into the NSW Rock Safety initiative. Funding was received for pamphlets and a rock fishing safety DVD was made. This was well received by the general public.

This year we introduced the project in Victoria through a pilot project. Refer to Stan's report for further reading.

Over the last 12 months we have been involved with various public projects, public discussion, discussion papers on key issues. Some with success some with no success. Refer to Vice Presidents report for further reading.

I would like to finish by saying thank you to my fellow Committee and Members for your support over the last 12 months and for giving me the opportunity in serving you and ANSA.

AUSTRALIAN NATIONAL SPORTFISHING ASSOCIATION NEW SOUTH WALES BRANCH TREASURER'S REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2007

Firstly I would like to take this opportunity to thank the outgoing Treasurer, John Burgess for his efforts in the role over the last 12 years. Enjoy your well deserved break John!

The financial statements for the 2006-07 financial year are appended to this report. Financially, ANSA NSW Branch remains in a sound position, with a bank balance of \$19,551.85. The operating result for the period was a deficit of \$3,630.60, against a budgeted surplus of \$210.00. I would note that, excluding the unbudgeted items, the financial results would have been very close to our original budget.

The following items should be noted when considering the current year's results:

- a) Total income for the year was \$16,225, which was on budget. A shortfall in membership income of \$934 compared to budget was offset by unbudgeted website sponsorship income of \$1,000.
- b) Total expenses for the year were \$19,855, which was \$3,815 over budget and \$5,992 higher than last year. Significant expense items are as follows;
 - At the June Committee meeting, the Committee voted to contribute \$1,500 towards the legal costs of defending the AAT hearing by the Nature Conservation Council. This was paid in 2005-06 and was not budgeted for. The Committee felt that this was a small price to pay to defend recreational angling against further expansion of "no fishing" zones. The outcome of the hearing had not been determined at the time of this report.
 - The Columbia Shirt offer to members has been a huge success, with over 200 shirts purchased by club members. A double-edged sword, with ANSA NSW subsidising the shirts to the tune of \$1,500, which covered the costs of embroidery plus a subsidy on the shirt itself, against a general budget of \$500 for Promotions.
 - Expenditure on the ANSA NSW website were \$1,210 over budget, with the Committee
 agreeing last year to revamp and redevelop the site. This was partially offset by the sale
 of advertising space on the site, which brought in \$1,000 in income. I trust that members
 agree the efforts with the website were worthwhile. It is a first-class site and a great
 promotion for ANSA NSW.
 - ANSA NSW contributed \$980 towards the cost of the 2005-06 Presentation and AGM, an
 expense which was not budgeted for.
 - Costs of phone, fax and email were \$480 below budget, I suspect due to Committee members not claiming their full reimbursements.
 - Insurances and National fees were lower than expected due to less than budgeted membership.

I have prepared a budget for the current year which again will see us with a modest surplus, while maintaining services to members at current levels and ensuring our ongoing viability.

Existing Angel Rings funding has mostly been spent. Additional funding from the Recreational Fishing Community Grants Programme will see the Angel Rings project continue for at least a further 2 years. The Police project is nearing the rollout phase, with the remaining funds scheduled to be spent in the coming year. These projects are covered further by the President in his Angel Rings report.

Recorder's Report

There were some mixed results for the ANSA NSW competitions this year, with a marked drop in the number of 12-Month competition entries, but a jump in the number of entrants in the State Titles. There were still a goodly number of State Records, and a slight rise in the number of Australian Record claims.

In addition, a new competition was launched, this being the ANSA NSW Convention Circuit. This competition was taken from the results of the 6 conventions through the year.

12-Month Competition

This year's 12-Month competition attracted 161 entries, well down from last years 310. This compares to 396 entries for 2004/05, and 186 for 2003/04. Entries were logged in all categories, though there were several gaps.

10 Clubs submitted entries as follows:

Wollongong 36 Canberra 32 **Botany Bay** 27 St George 26 South Sydney 15 Newcastle 7 Eden Sea Bees 4 3 Nowra AFA Sportfishing 2.

Entries were submitted for 59 individual anglers, and 35 species of fish were logged.

There are no rule changes flagged for this year, though there is one that I would like to see changed. Currently there is a 5-week lag at the end of the fishing year for entries to be submitted. I would like to see this requirement dropped to 2 or 3 weeks, as all it seems to do is to hold up processes at the end of the year.

State Titles

The State Titles for 2007 were held in a slightly different format to previous years, with only a single tackle division, rather than the 2 for previous years. A minor cosmetic change was the idea of an extended period to return entries to the Recorder, but as all entries were submitted within days anyway, this will be dropped for next year.

This year there were 69 entries from 9 clubs, in 22 Senior and 3 Junior teams. This was well up from last years 37 anglers in 13 teams from 4 clubs.

As from next year, placings at the State Titles will count towards the ANSA NSW Convention Circuit.

ANSA NSW Convention Circuit

A new competition was instigated for the 2006-07 fishing year. The competition, the brain-child of ex-President Les Waldock, was taken from the entries and results for each of the 6 convention held for the 2006-07 fishing year.

All anglers who attended and registered at the 6 conventions accumulated attendance points, bonus attendance points for each 3 conventions fished, and accumulated competition points based on the placings for the St Georges trophy at each convention – ie anglers received points for attending, and points for placings in each St George category.

The competition was keenly fought, and I think makes a good addition to the ANSA NSW competitions.

For next years Convention Circuit, points will be accumulated from the 6 conventions, as well as the NSW State Titles. Attendance points will not be tallied from the State Titles, but the 5 highest-scoring fish in each category will attract competition points.

There are 4 categories in the ACC:

Senior Male Ladies Junior Boy Junior Girl

State Records

The number of State Records continues to drop, though more slowly than previously. This is in the main because of the quality of the captures now required to break an existing record. This is exactly what I would have expected.

There were 116 new line class records set for this fishing year.

National Records

There were 25 new National Record claims submitted for 2006/07, and of these 17 have so far been granted.

ANNUAL REPORT TAGGING AND CATCH AND RELEASE PROJECTS 2006-2007



GAMEFISH TAGGING PROGRAM

NSW Department of Primary Industries (DPI) has been operating the NSW Gamefish Tagging Program since 1973. The program has resulted in over 328,000 fish successfully tagged to date and this has included over 60 species of fish.

There are now 4 tags being used in the NSWDPI- Fisheries Gamefish Tagging Program;

- The smaller pink tag is a small pelagic tag used for species such as Mahi Mahi, Bonito and Salmon
- The yellow nylon tag is for species like Tuna, Kingfish over 80cm, Cobia, Wahoo and Albacore
- 3. The yellow steel tag is for sharks only
- 4. The red nylon tag is now for all Billfish only



The flow of information about the GFTP continues out to the clubs, with updates and Bulletins being sent every few months and all updates and changes sitting on the www.ansansw.com.au/projects/projEligibleSpeciesList.pdf and all the updated tagging bulletins 11, 12, 13 and 14 http://www.ansansw.com.au/NewTag.html







KINGFISH CHANGES

This year NSW DPI asked us to encourage a shift in kingfish tagging activity. ANSA NSW Clubs had tagged over 2000 Kingfish last season and this has resulted in some useful data on kingfish, however it appears that on a cost benefit basis it would be more beneficial to change the focus from tagging juvenile fish. Tagging data has revealed that kingfish have a high recapture rate, standing at approximately 6.9%. Over the past five

years, 372 kingfish have been recaptured; of which only 20 of these (5.4%) have been caught more than 100 nautical miles from original release, despite an average time at liberty of 168 days. Further to this, 86% of recaptured fish have been caught within 50 miles of their release locations. This appears to demonstrate that kingfish, particularly juveniles, generally undertake very limited movements.

Anecdotal evidence suggests that kingfish do leave their limited home ranges for a short period of time, possibly for spawning related activities. This is an area of particular interest for management of kingfish stocks. Research has shown that the smallest mature kingfish are 80cm in length, therefore it is suggested that the tagging of juveniles (up to 80cm) is reduced and the tagging of mature fish (= 80cm or over) is encouraged to establish better data on spawning related movements. It would be appreciated if you could relay this message to your members and encourage this shift in kingfish tagging activity. Please note that tagging of pelagic fish of 80cm or over should be madertaken with the large pelagic tag, which is currently yellow in colour.

TAGGING AWARD CHANGES

ANSA NSW will be making some changes to our awards system in relation to tagging masters that will finally bring us into line with all the other states and under the AUSTAG banner of awards systems. The old Tagging Masters will be replaced with AUSTAG Tagging Achievement and Tagging Excellence Award. These awards were established by ANSA National in 2001, but NSW is now the only state not applying the new awards. With ANSA National set to cease issuing the old Tagging Masters awards in 2008, we will be making the necessary changes in the next few months. An update will be sent to all clubs in the very near future.

BASS AND ESTUARY PERCH DNA SAMPLING

This year ANSA NSW had been asked to once again to support a research establishment in much the same the way we assisted the University of Tasmania and FRDC in the recently completed Flathead Survival Project.

Kim Shaddick, a PhD student from Macquarie University (Sydney) was working on conservation-oriented study of the evolutionary history of perches and basses. The project focused on the catadromous estuary perch and Australian bass and used DNA markers to clarify the population genetic structure of both species. The use of a DNA approach enabled the researchers to distinguish between natural population structures and those affected by stocking activities. The information will be used to suggest management strategies aimed at preserving the genetic integrity of the two species. This project was a collaborative effort that involves the Molecular Ecology Laboratory at Macquaric University and the DPI Fisheries conservation program at Narrandera. It had been suggested that the these two fish species are geographically structured along the coast and that even though they have the ability to disperse over long distances you don't see too much mixing between the populations. However, for a proper understanding of population structure, Kim needed to analyse samples from the entire range where the species are distributed.

Kim was after fin elippings from specific location in NSW and Victoria. Specimen vials and work instructions were be provided to participating anglers by NEWTAG and collected. Kim is currently working on preparing a final report and the many samples provided by us were invaluable to her research.

Over the last fishing year there were no Masters Awards claimed in the following categories: Flyfishing, Handlining, Land based Gamefishing, Freshwater Impoundments, Land based Sportfishing but I am sure there are members working on these awards.

Confusion addressed:

Over the last twelve months there has been a little confusion in regard to the correct procedure in submitting claims for Masters Awards. This is perhaps for a number of reasons: Firstly my predecessor Bruce Tozer played a duel role with both ANSA - NSW and ANSA - National in processing Branch Masters claims and updating Nationals Master Records. On that basis the correct process did not really matter as long as any Masters Claim got to Bruce.

Secondly the Masters Claim Form that was previously on the National web site during the last twelve months required a Masters Claim Form to be forwarded by a Club to the Branch (NSW) Record Keeper. This issue was brought to the attention of the ANSA National Executive Officer earlier this year and I am pleased to advise the Masters Form on the National web site has now been modified.

And finally Clubs/Members are using very old Masters Form's – some 10 years old.

In the future, National propose to review the current Masters Claim process and address inconsistencies that currently applies to Tagging Masters between Branches.

Procedure for 2007/08

After downloading a Masters Claim Form from the ANSA National web site the applicant fills in the capture details and signs it. The form is then signed by the respective Club Recorder. The Masters Claim is then forwarded to:

Max Castle – NSW Branch Masters Keeper (address below) for recording, processing and forwarding to National. National process the claim then post the Masters certificate patch and pin to the NSW Branch Masters Keeper who posts the award to the respective Club Secretary.

I would be pleased if each Club Secretary could advise me via email (details below) when they receive members Masters Award so I can promptly complete my records and update the information for the ANSA – NSW web site. Good mastering to all!

Editor/Club Liaison Officers' Annual Report

The Editor/Club Liaison Officer portfolio basically involves collating, updating, maintaining, and monitoring of communication avenues and information between ANSA NSW and member Clubs. This basically involved the re-vamping of the ANSA NSW email database and ensuring consistent and current information was getting out to the ANSA NSW Clubs.

The ANSA NSW email database has gone ahead in leaps and bounds. The database currently hosts 33 of the 35 ANSA NSW affiliated Clubs. The only two Clubs that are not on the email database are Bargo Fishing Club and Northern Rivers Hotel Fishing Club. Most of the Clubs on the database have minimum one contact. In total, the database hosts 60 points of contact, which includes the ANSA NSW direct membership, Sportfishing NSW.

It has been a hard sell and has taken many hours to reconstruct and maintain the database. Although the feedback has been positive from our affiliated Clubs, ANSA NSW still feels that the information is not filtering through to the members of these Clubs efficiently. The Website.

As far as communication is concerned, ANSA NSW's greatest achievement must be the launch of its new website. The reconstruction of the ANSA NSW website was a major step in ensuring that the ANSA NSW membership had a tool that was concise, easy to operate, readily maintainable, atheistically pleasing and available 24 hours a day.

In the past, the website was always maintained in house by a volunteer webmaster, Peter Kenyon. With commitments to his growing family, Peter unfortunately could not continue his services to ANSA NSW. I take this opportunity thank Peter for his commitment for some three years and commend him for his service to ANSA NSW.

ANSA NSW decided to employ a professional webmaster to redesign, construct and maintain a new website. This of course was going to cost a fairly substantial amount of money. Hence, ANSA NSW went in search of sponsors that could aid to the cost of the construction and maintenance of the new ANSA NSW website.

It was surprisingly easy and several companies jumped at the opportunity to advertise on our new website. So before we knew it, the construction costs had been covered by advertising. Several Associations were approached and offered an opportunity to add a link to their sites on the ANSA NSW website and they too jumped at the opportunity. In affect, the website is paying for itself, with minimal outlays from ANSA NSW funds.

There were teething problems of course, but this was to be expected. Even so, the success of the ANSA NSW website has been amazing. In fact, in the first month that the ANSA NSW website was launched we expected a large volume of traffic. We were right. There were over 20,000 hits. This included 328 direct visits, 150 of these visits being unique

and a band width of over 41 mega bites. Although we expected the website traffic to drop in quantity, data records for June 2007 still have the site well trafficked with some 16,000 hits. This includes 329 direct visits, 225 of these visits being unique and a band width of over 75 mega bites.

ANNUAL REPORT ANGEL RINGS 2006-2007

06:07 has been another busy year for the team with not many new installations but a mile of maintenance related issues. This year we also established a new website, www.angelrings.com.au that has allowed us host all of our related material, management plans and maps on the one site, we further established links with like minded associations and government agencies that will further promote the program and we continue to chip away at the issue of rock fishing safety in our own unique way. We have shared our program with agencies in New Zealand and in May 06 had a research paper on Angel Rings accepted at the World Water Safety Conference in Portugal, and with funding approval pending we should be able to deliver the angel ring message in September 07. We have been also working on new installations at Tathra and Coffs Harbour and with months of ground work already completed final approval is very close for these installations.

Below is a snapshot of the 06/07 year for the angel ring team.

Angel Ring installations

Whilst we have not been idle and only installed 3 new assemblies since June 06, we have been busy replacing rings, plaques and posts. We have had a terrible year in terms of the size and frequency of large waves and swell that has been pounding our coastal rock platforms and inadvertently our angel rings. A replacement involves a physical check of the location and then sourcing the spares to go and do the job, so we are all continually scurrying along the rocks checking the installations. Calls are also received on the Freecall 1800 number to pick up rings that have been washed away, so we need to attend to these as well.

We also managed a flying visit to Red Rock, just north of Coffs Harbour. Mal, Yanko, Jim Kosyfas and I left Swansea at 5am, drove to Coffs, put 3 rings, posed for the local press, stopped off at the tackle shop and were back at Swansea for a Thai meal at 7.30pm, not a bad effort. A local resident, Marilyn Allen completed all the negotiations with the traditional owners of Red Rock, local council and lands department on our behalf and put her hand out to monitor the rings. In hindsight our job was easy! A very good outcome for ANSA NSW with the locals taking ownership of the angel rings in their area. I know I am hoping to foster more of these partnerships in the future.

Website

The www angelrings com an website is being upgraded to host all the management plans and maps of the rings and locations. This has taken some time, but updates are constantly being added. We are linking to many other sites that promote fishing safety. If your club has a website, make it a point to link back to the angel rings website and help us further promote rock fishing safety.

Recreational Fishing Community Grants Programme

The Angel Ring Project is set to continue beyond 2007 and into 2008 with the Recreational Fishing Community Grunts Programme (RFCGP) approving \$59,000 for the ANSA NSW Angel Ring Project.

With almost \$70,000 sourced from the NSW Recreational Fishing Trust Fund over the past few years for Angel Rings, ANSA NSW was pleased to see the Federal Government provide assistance to continue the project. The funds will be used to maintain and install angel rings across NSW. Current locations up for approval include locations in Tathra and Coffs Harbour. Funds have also been made available under the grant to build a new installation and display trailer for the project. Transport of equipment and tools will be a lot easier and the trailer will double as a mobile rock fishing safety display, complete with DVD Player. Volunteers from ANSA NSW will be out and about highlighting the project and rock fishing safety.

The Federal Fisheries Minister, the Hon Eric Abetz has supported all the applications that have been presented in relation to rock fishing safety, including a roll out of free rockfishing safety DVDs on a national fishing magazine and delivery to of the DVD to non-traditional tackle outlets.

ANSA National and Angel Rings

In April 2007, ANSA NSW coordinated the installation of 8 Augel Rings in Victoria as a pilot program and is looking at other States that it can help with rockfishing safety issues. This project was collaboration between ANSA National. Lifesaving Victoria, ANSA NSW and ANSA Victoria. The RFCGP approved the initial funding of \$8,000 for ANSA National to investigate and distribute rock fishing information that was the catalyst for this pilot project. Additional work is now being done across Australia under the ongoing RFCGP Project

NSW Recreational Fishing Trust Fund

The NSW Fisheries Minister, the Hon Ian Macdonald and the NSW Trust Fund have been big supporters of the rock fishing safety initiative that has been ougoing for a few years now within NSW.

The Angel Ring Project has also benefited by the work The Recreational Fishing Alliance of NSW (RFA of NSW), NSW DPI – Fisheries and the Department of Sport and Recreation are doing on rockfishing safety within NSW. These rockfishing safety projects include translated DVDs, CD-ROMS, and community

workshops, translated resource material and have amounted to almost \$200,000 in funding that ANSA NSW and the RFA of NSW have managed over the past 3 years.

ANSA NSW Police Angel Ring Project:

The recently funded Recreational Fishing Community Grants Programme (RFCGP) project that will see Angel Rings issued to NSW Police Local Area Commands is nearing completion and final implementation.

Almost 12 months of behind the scenes work has been completed and a rollout of rings is expected in the near future. Back in 2005 Inspector Ralph Deans from Eastern Suburbs Local Area Command initiated a trial project that saw 3 local stations equipped with angel rings as a first response to a call out for a rock fishing rescue. Most calls for help are coordinated via the Police and 000. A further \$34,000 was granted to ANSA NSW to rollout the project state wide. The Marine Area Command, the Commissioners Inspectorate and ANSA NSW are now finalising the locations, internal procedures, operating manuals and instructional manuals on the angle rings and rock sofety issues.

ANSA NSW sees this project as adding an additional rescue tool into the NSW Police response to these rescues. It will be more evident in smaller coastal towns where rescue helicopters and launches may be hours away to assist an angler in the water. Police offices are often first on the scene and having a ring to throw to someone will increase there chances of survival untill assistance arrives. The project team realises that there will be limitations such as access and large seas to the successful deployment, but the opportunity to save 'a' life far outweighs these drawbacks. The work the Marine Area Command, the Commissioners Inspectorate and the pioneering work by Ralph Deans is a credit to the NSW Police Force and their willingness to assist ANSA NSW in its attempt to save the lives off anglers washed in off the rocks.

Augel Rings Victoria:

After almost 16 months of planning that included consultation with Parks Victoria, Life Saving Victoria, Victoria Police, ANSA National, ANSA NSW, ANSA VIC and funding sourced from ESSO and the Victorian Fishing Licence Trust the project was finally off the ground. Eight (8) Angel Ring Life Buoys were installed at popular fishing spots at Wilson's Promontory and the Bass Coast near Phillip Is. The spots selected have had fatalities associated with rock fishing in the past. One of the biggest obstacles faced by the planning team was access to the spots, with long walks and goat tracks down the cliffs to get to these locations. With the assistance of Parks Victoria Rangers who led the way during the entire process, the only complaints were sore legs. ANSA Vic and Life Saving Victoria will now embark on an education campaign aimed at non-English speaking anglers who fish these rock platforms.

The pilot project at these locations is expected to run for 2 years, but already ANSA Vic is assessing other locations in Victoria that would benefit from an angel ring. Brian Hayes, President of ANSA Vic stated "that these rings are the last line of defence in case an angler is washed off the rocks whilst fishing. What we are focusing on is education to stop these anglers getting into a situation where there is a risk of this happening."

Many thanks to Brian and his ANSA Vie members, who picked up, stored and carried the rings in with Yanko and me. A manunoth task that involved trucks, planes and automobiles and a 700km round trip for Yanko and I to and from Melbourne Airport!










Recreational Fishing Alliance of NSW Report to ANSA NSW

RIBP is a new concept; it has been developed by the Irrigation Futures (CRC) to explicitly recognise the importance of business in developing improvements in multi-purpose water use productivity. It's about looking at the environmental, economic and social systems in which irrigation dependent businesses operate and deliver better irrigation for a better environment and a better future.

The RFA also has two representatives on the NSW Maritime - Recreational Vessel Advisory Group. A bi-monthly meeting of waterway users meet with the GM of NSW Maritime to discuss issues of concern to waterway users.

Participants include. NSW Police, Boat Owners Assoc., Seaplanes Pilots Assoc., Sailing NSW, Coast Guard, Coastal Patrol, RFA of NSW and the like.

Special issues covered include boating accidents, new waterways restrictions or restrictions for special events. No wash zone issues, safety equipment, crossing bars, recreational boating client survey, size of vessel registration numbers, boat ramps and repairs and impoundment safety.

The RFA of NSW has also continued it's involvement with community education, in the field of rock fishing safety. We have and still are distributing "Rock Fishing Safety Packs". These packs are an extension of our "Rock Fishing Safety DVD Campaign" These packs are free of charge, as were the DVDs. More gains can be made by trying to negotiate a better deal or outcome for NSW anglers with the NSW Government and its Departments/Agencies.

One thing we have accepted is that you win some and you loose some battles, however the efforts of the RFA of NSW Executive and membership should always be focused on sustainable fishing and access for all.
