Vice President's Report

It's great to see life back to normal for most of us but it is still going to take some time before we fully recover from the impacts of crazy weather, pandemics and a global financial crisis which have gripped the nation over recent years.

On reviewing the 2022/23 year it is regrettable but understandable that many of our longstanding NSW clubs have not been able to weather the combination of these unfortunate events. Our affiliated club and membership numbers are currently sitting at 21 and 806 respectively which is a slight improvement on the numbers for the prior year but well short of where we were some 4 or 5 years ago when Branch club numbers hovered at around 40 and membership was around 1200. This is not a problem unique to NSW as most state branches of ANSA are experiencing similar challenges as are other recreational fishing peak bodies. ANSA National and NSW Branch have concessionally reduced their membership fees over the past 3 years to assist clubs financially but this concession ended last year. The NSW Branch Committee stands ready to do whatever it can to assist clubs over these difficult times.

Fortunately our opportunities to go fishing and the general state of our fisheries have not been unduly affected by these events and by all accounts the fishing tackle, boating and camping trade sectors are experiencing a boom time with so many of us wanting to spend more leisure time outdoors with family and friends enjoying the healthy life style of being at one with nature.

According to the recently released "National Social and Economic Survey of Recreational Fishers" around one in five Australians goes fishing at least once a year. In fact the number of people who go fishing has increased from around 3.4 million in 1999/2000 to 4.2 million over 2020. Australians spend an estimated 28 million days fishing each year and contribute over \$11 billion to the national economy and keep over 100,000 in jobs. NSW and the ACT conjointly spend an estimated 10 million days fishing each year and generate \$4 bill for the national economy and carry 33,000 jobs. From a social licence perspective 61% of all Australians felt recreational fishing was a very acceptable activity and another 8.1% found it moderately acceptable. Only 8.2% felt it was unacceptable and another 12.7% were unsure.

The challenge for ANSA across the nation is to continue on its pathway of rebuilding club and member numbers. There is no quick fix or silver bullet for making this happen but the opportunities are obviously there and we need to think outside the box as to how we react to these opportunities, in particular to generate more appeal to the younger generation of recreational fishers of being part of a club.

Also given the social and economic value of recreational fishing to the nation and its member states it is evident that more recognition must be given to the sector by government at all levels and our value properly measured when making policy which impacts directly or indirectly upon recreational fishing. It is up to all of us as individuals to get this message across to all within the broad circle of government. Of current concern are proposals for offshore wind power generation and gas extraction.

In this context it is pleasing that NSW DPI has stocked 67,000 juvenile Mulloway into the Georges River, 36,000 into the Hastings River and 23,000 into Lake Macquarie. We need to see more initiatives such as this to give mother nature a helping hand and likewise to also to improve our access to all waterways with the provision of better boating and fishing infrastructure across the state. With the recent changes to government at a Federal and State level the time is right for recreational fishers and the marine estate and environment to be given a fairer go.

There are also opportunities for ANSA members to get more involved with fish habitat rehabilitation activities with bodies such as Ozfish who are always looking for new partners to jointly undertake rehabilitation projects. This is great way to build on the social licence of recreational fishing and to make a positive and meaningful difference to our marine environment as well as interacting with like minded individuals who could be potential club members. If you want to know more about Ozfish visit the website (info@ozfish.org.au) or get in touch with me direct.

An important date to keep aside is Gone Fishing day to be held on 8 October. NSW DPI is again inviting clubs to apply for a GFD fishing package of up to \$2000 to host events - this can be either by way of grant or the provision of fishing tackle and prizes etc. Application forms are available at (bit.ly/450FS6e) and must be submitted before

8 September. This is another opportunity to promote your club and ANSA.

President Stan will bring you up to date on what NSW Branch is doing in terms of advocacy, new activities and the Angel Ring project.

I look forward to catching up with many of you at the AGM and Presentation night hosted by Botany Bay Sport Fishing Club. It's been a long time since many of us have had the chance to meet face to face so do your best to get there.

Our financial year finished with a combined bank balance of \$23,372.11 comprising of \$18,372.11 in the main account & \$5000.00 in the project account.

Most noticeable differences this year, against Budgets, were:

<u>Income</u> - Membership for Club persons increasing by almost \$ 5000.00 mostly due to the membership cost increase from the previously reduced amount during the Covid period.

Expenditure - National Affiliation fee's \$ 2650.00 (due to membership increases)

- Insurance increase of \$650.00
- Angel rings Project costs \$ 4187.00

Altogether we had a combined deficit of - \$ 2442.85

If the Clubs membership trends stay on track, as they have for the last 12 months, then all going well for 2023-2024, we should have a Surplus just short of \$1700.00.

Recorder's Report - Competitions

For three years we've had a wet summer and for three years, the number of entries in the 12 Month Competition was relatively low. In particular, the usual late surge in captures from the Mid-North as very low this year. It will be interesting to see how the 2023-24 competition goes if we get a drier summer.

2022-23 saw 34 anglers from 6 ANSA clubs submitting entries in the 12 Month Competition. A total of 81 fish were recorded, which is slightly down on the number of entries in the 2021-22 competition, although the quality was certainly there.

In a big shift from last year, the most popular section was Tagging, with 13 entries, followed by the Length only – Trout division, with 9 entries. This year, entries were evenly spread across line class and length only divisions, with 32 entries across divisions 1 to 15 (line class) and 33 across divisions 17 to 25 (length). Across all divisions, the most popular species was Brown Trout with 14 entries, followed by Black Marlin with 12 entries (10 tagged).

This year, the Most Versatile Angler Division was won by Terry Tatton from Wollongong Sportfishing Club on 18 points, followed by Chris Stolk (also from Wollongong) on 10 points. Congratulations Terry!

Congratulations to the Wollongong Sportfishing Club for again taking out the Champion Club trophy with 47 points. Canberra Fisherman's Club were in second place with 25.5 points.

Finally, I'd like to again encourage ANSA members to get involved in the 12 Month Competition even if you don't think your entry will be a potential winner. First of all, you may surprise yourself there are quite a few vacancies in the final standings (next page). Secondly, the Most Versatile Angler competition is probably the most challenging of all 12 Month Competition Divisions, with winners calculated by combining ANSA point scores earned by anglers across all Divisions (minimum 50 ANSA points per entry). Captures don't have to be individual winners, but the more Divisions that you enter, the more Most Versatile Angler points you accrue.

I hope the forecasts of a drier summer mean better fishing in 2022-23 for you – and don't forget to get those entry forms in!!

All ANSA NSW clubs and their members should be aware that these Angel Rings (orange life buoy's) are easily identifiable from any other life buoy with the following marks, a NSW Recreational Fishing Trust logo which has funded several operational grants since the early 2000's, and a ANSA NSW Logo along with the embossed wording if found, to call the ANSA NSW Free Call 1800 079 009 and leave your details and a brief message or if you see an Angel Ring post is bare.



Interfering with or removing from public use any type of 'Public Rescue Equipment' can incur a \$5,000.00 Fine and a Criminal Record for life should a person be found guilty of such laws and if there is an opportunity to help ANSA NSW spread the word, ANSA NSW Clubs are encouraged to do so.

Finally it was amazing to have the Sea Bees Fishing Club once again donate \$750.00 to the Angel Ring Project. These were the proceeds from their 2023 Lake Lyell Convention and will go to helping some of the costs incurred by the Project.

Special Projects – NEWTAG Report

Swordfish Tagging Update

As you know, the swordfish updates have been relatively quiet, mostly based on the challenge that our taggers have faced in finding swordfish off the NSW coast.

Over the last year (2022/23), there was one swordfish tagged (by Al McGlashan) and recaptured.

We were also due to receive satellite data from an earlier tag of Al's (tagged in April 2022 off Mallacoota) but nothing materialised. This was likely linked to the recently identified battery/software failure problem.

The 7 tags were retrieved from the taggers and sent back to the US earlier this year (as there was a recall by the manufacturer). We received 3 back with software updates around 3 weeks ago and have issued one to Al McGlashan as he was still hopeful of tagging a further swordfish on the south coast.

The other 4 tags are due back in Sept/ Oct latest - these will be new tags as the old ones needed replacement batteries. They are being replaced free of charge.

The manufacturer has advised that these tags have a maximum reliable shelf life of up to 24 months and as such, we need to make a concerted effort to get them deployed this year.

In early 2023, we agreed to extend tagging to striped marlin due to the issues with catching swordfish over the last 4 years. However, no stripes were tagged due to the manufacturer's recall of the tags.

With the updated and new tags, we should be able to get all tags into stripes or swords this upcoming season. As previously discussed, the emphasis needs to be on getting tags into fish prior to any further battery-based issues (noting they will not be able to be covered again by warranty). I think it was very fortunate that Wildlife Computers agreed to issue us replacements for our old tags from 2019.

Swordfish satellite tagged by Cooper McGlashan off Bermagui recaptured


The satellite tag deployed on 24 July 2022 by Al McGlashan's family-based crew was recently retrieved by a NSW south coast longline vessel fishing off the Bass Canyon area, in Victorian waters on 27 September.


The tag started communicating with satellites and streaming data to DPI from the vessel and after making some enquiries, the tag was tracked down and kindly provided to us by the boat owner. The fish was estimated to have been around 20 kg on release and on its recapture. This recapture reinforces the current thinking on survival of angler released swordfish: this being that swordfish that are showing good colour, tail and eye movement and are not deep hooked, exhibiting barotrauma or bleeding are likely to be good candidates for release.

As with previous satellite tagged swordfish, the depth data shows that the fish carried out the typical pattern of diving deep during the day and rising near to the surface after sunset. It is believed that this is linked to the swords foraging for food in the Deep Scattering Layer (DSL). You can see that during the period coming up to the full moon on 12 August, the fish tends to remain slightly deeper at night - this is likely to be linked to the DSL sitting slightly lower during the period with the higher illumination from the full moon. The normal daytime diving depth appeared to vary from around 400 - 700m+ with some shallower and deeper dives over time.

On tagging, it appears that the fish moved steadily headed east for around 90 NM before moving in a general south westerly direction, over the Victorian border and tracking towards the entrance of Bass Canyon where it was caught by a longline vessel at the end of September. During that time the surface water surface ranged from around 18.5 °C to around 14.5 °C with the deepest dives dropping the recorded temperature regularly down to 8 °C and below, with the lowest temperature being around 6.5 °C.

DPI is undertaking this project in collaboration with the Australian National Sportfishing Association (NSW) and NSW Game Fishing Association with funds supplied by the NSW Recreational Fishing Licence Trust and have also partnered with the Institute for Marine and Antarctic Studies (IMAS) which has a similar swordfish program.
